ABOUT RDA

Rural Development Association (RDA) is a registered non-govt. social service organisation. It has been working in the Western part of Midnapore District (presently known as Paschim Medinipur) of West Bengal since 1980. From 1984 RDA has extended its area of operation in the neighbouring Ghatshila Block of East Singbhum District of Jharkhand (erstwhile South Bihar). The West Bengal chapter is known as Midnapore Project and the other one is known as Singbhum Project.

In Midnapore RDA has been working in the remote rural areas falling under Jhargram, Sankrail, Keshiary. Under Singbhum Project RDA is working in Ghatshila and Dhalbhumgarh blocks. All the areas have almost similar geographical and climatic condition. Demographic profile is more or less the same.

RDA is registered as a society under the West Bengal Societies Registration Act (1961). To receive foreign contributions, it is registered under Foreign Contribution Regulatory Act (FCRA). The owners of RDA are its Governing Body, which constitutes of nine members. They include individuals from academic and social service institutions. The person responsible for day-to-day functioning and decision-making is its Secretary-Ex- Officio Director.

RDA's Head Office or Central Coordinating Office is at Paschim Medinipur Sadar (District HQ). In the operational Blocks RDA has Field Offices.

WEST BENGAL PROJECTS

USHARMUKTI Plus and USHARMUKTI Towards Evergreen in Jhargram District

Introduction

The Jhargram District in West Bengal is one of the poorest and most food-insecure areas in the state. Most families in this district dependant on agriculture, but only about 10% of the farmland has irrigation. This makes it hard for farmers to grow crops round the year.

Project Background

To improve conditions, the Usharmukti project began working on water conservation and plantation projects to support agriculture. While these efforts have helped, they alone aren't enough to reduce poverty in the area. For meaningful change, more actions are needed to improve the lives and livelihoods of the local farming communities.

The Usharmukti Plus activities, funded by the Bharat Rural Livelihoods Foundation (BRLF), ran until July 2023. Since January 2024, IndusInd Bank Ltd (IBL) has been funding further for NRM based activities, now called *Usharmukti towards Evergreen in Jhargram district*, in partnership with PRADAN.

Project Activities:

Natural Resource Management (NRM) Activities

Rural Development Association has been working on Natural Resource Management (NRM) activities in collaboration with various government departments, including Agri-Irrigation, Agri-Mechanical, Soil Conservation and co-funding support also mobilised from IndusInd Bank Ltd.

Key Achievements

- *Irrigation Structures Built*: 47 irrigation structures have been set up, which will provide water to an additional 105 hectares of farmland and will mobilise support of Rs.3.95 lakhs.

Pisciculture:

This ongoing work in Jhargram is expected to support farmers, increase agricultural productivity, and improve livelihoods in the area. This year, RDA Jhargram Team helped small fish farmers in 41 villages across 8 Gram Panchayats (GPs) to develop organic fish farming. They worked with 324 households (HHs) to manage fish ponds covering a total area of 38 hectares. In these ponds, 320,000 young fish (fingerlings) were released.

RDA, with support from the district's Fishery Department, provided training to these farmers. Additionally, the Agriculture Department provided 55,000 fingerlings, helping 100 households

in 6 villages across 2 GPs. This support was valued at Rs.2.83 lakhs. Through their efforts, the farmers produced 28 tons of fish, and each farmer earned around Rs.8,700 from selling their fish.

RDA also worked with 27 farmers to develop nursery businesses for growing and selling fingerlings. These farmers earned about Rs.2.63 lakhs in total, increasing their average income by around Rs.10,000. With assistance from the Fishery Department, 10 fishery registration cards were also issued in the names of women farmers, giving them official recognition.

Achievements in Agriculture:

RDA worked with 1,654 households across 50 villages in 11 Gram Panchayats (GPs) to support agriculture and set up 34 women-led Producers' Groups (PGs). Together, they grew a variety of crops throughout the year, including bitter gourd, cowpea, cucumber, brinjal, bottle gourd, long beans, ridge gourd, tomato, traditional and aromatic rice, groundnut, mustard, and sesame. These crops were grown over a total area of 342.4 hectares. This effort resulted in a total harvest of 2,666 tons of agriculture produces and generated Rs.666 lakhs in sales. Each farmer earned an additional income of about Rs.40,268.

Case Study: Dharitri Mahata

Dharitri Mahata, a member of the Purnapani Adivasi Producers' Group, lives with her husband, mother-in-law, son, and daughter. Initially, they worked as agricultural day laborers. In 2018-

19, she excavated an 80 ft x 60 ft x 12 ft pond on her land under the USHARMUKTI Project but struggled with fish rearing.

In 2023-24, after receiving guidance from RDA personnel, she improved her fish-rearing practices and harvested 150 kg of fish, earning Rs. 18,000. Instead of buying fingerlings, she decided to breed her own and leased a small pond for Rs. 2,000, where she sold 8,000 fingerlings for Rs. 16,000, while also using 700 fingerlings for her pond.

The pond provided irrigation for one bigha of Badshabhog rice, yielding 6 quintals worth Rs. 19,200. She also grew bitter gourd and mustard, earning Rs. 32,400 and Rs. 6,650, respectively, and cultivated sesame in the pre-Kharif season, earning Rs.



6,600. In total, Dharitri earned Rs. 98,850 that year from fish rearing and aromatic rice cultivation.

Dharitri's success has transformed her family's life, allowing them to thrive and live happily.

Case Study: Sumita Mahata

Sumita Mahata of Gira village, primarily engaged in agriculture with her husband. Although she completed her Madhyamik exams before marriage, she focused on family and farming, which supports their yearly food needs but not their financial goals. They own 7 bighas of land and aim to improve their economic status.

In 2017-18, the West Bengal government provided support for farmers, leading Sumita and her husband to excavate a pond for irrigation, which was completed in 2018-19. Despite their efforts to grow paddy and vegetables, their initial yields were insufficient for better income.

In 2022-23, from the motivational support of RDA, Sumita took lead role to form the Putalaxmi Producers' Group with 68 members, aiming to enhance income through advanced agricultural practices and collective marketing.



from cultivation and fish rearing.

During the Kharif season, Sumita cultivated Badshabhog paddy and Indigenous Paddy, yielding 4 quintals (Rs. 12,800) and 8 quintals (Rs. 14,400) respectively. In the Rabi season, she grew bitter gourd (18 quintals, Rs. 32,400), mustard (95 kg, Rs. 6,175), and sesame (110 kg, Rs. 6,600).

Sumita plans to venture into fish rearing, expecting to grow 15,000 fingerlings in one pond and 1,200 in another, with anticipated earnings of Rs. 30,000 from fish. Overall, she expects a total income of Rs. 110,375

As a proactive housewife, Sumita has inspired her community and emerged as a leader in the Putalaxmi Producers' Group.

Seed Village Programme

Sankrail Block, Jhargram District, West Bengal

Location of Seed Production:

The Seed Village Program took place in Sankrail, Jhargram, Gopiballavpur-2 blocks in Jhargram District; Midnapur Sadar, Kharagpur Sadar, Pingla, Sabang, and Debra blocks in Paschim Medinipur District; and Sarenga, Mukutmanipur, and Chhatna blocks in Bankura District.

Pre-Kharif Season:

In the Pre-Kharif season, 87 farmers grew paddy on 20 hectares of land. They harvested 43 tons of raw seeds, primarily from the Pingla and Sabang blocks. After processing, 35 tons of high-quality seeds were prepared for cultivation in summer.

Kharif Season (Rainy Season):

During the rainy season, 135 farmers cultivated paddy on 50 hectares. Of these, 96 farmers (covering 37 hectares) participated in the Seed Certification Program, while 39 farmers grew seeds on 13 hectares at a "Truthful Level" (T/L), meaning the seeds were of good quality but without formal certification. In total, 150 tons of seeds were harvested: 100 tons certified and 50 tons T/L. The Assistant Director of Agriculture visited the fields, collected samples, and sent them for testing to the State Seed Testing Laboratory in Kolkata. All samples met quality standards.

Rabi Season (Summer Season):

In the summer, farmers cultivated paddy on 8 hectares using varieties like MTU1010, IET 9947 (Lalat), IR 36, IR 64, Chaitali, IET 4094, GB-1, IET 4786, and Khandagiri. They harvested 26 tons of raw seeds, and by the end of the year, 200 tons of processed seeds were ready for the market under the brand name RDA Seeds. Popular varieties included MTU7029, MTU1010, IET9947 (Lalat), IET4786 (Shankar), Shyamashree, IET-4555 (IR-36), GB-1 (IET17430), Sahabhagi Dhan, CR-1017, CR-1018, Super Shyamali, Bullet, Khandagiri, and Gobinda Bhog.

Market Development: Markets were established in Paschim Medinipur, Purba Medinipur, Purulia, and nearby areas in Jharkhand and Odisha. Approximately 190 tons of seeds were sold this year, farmers earned an extra Rs.200–Rs.400 per quintal compared to open market rates.

Partnerships and Support: RDA collaborated with the State Seed Corporation, Barasat; Chinsura Rice Research Centre, Hooghly; and the Seed Association of Bengal to obtain Breeder Seeds and the foundation seeds for certified seed production.

JHARKHAND PROJECT 2023-24

Project Title: "SMILE" Improvement in Life of the marginalized Tribal Children through Quality Education, Participation and Protection in East Singhbhum district of Jharkhand.

Supported By: Terre des Hommes, Suisse.

Areas of Intervention:

 Provide quality education support to remote rural tribal children through 5 education support centers, ensuring they can continue and complete their studies.



- Raise awareness and build capacity among children, youth, SHG members, parents, and the community about child rights, focusing on the importance of education, protecting children from early marriage, addressing climate change, and the role of the community and stakeholders in safeguarding children and the environment.
- Increase the participation of children and young people in various platforms, including child clubs, education support centers (SEC), village-level child protection committees (VLCPC), Child Cabinets in public schools, youth groups, and monitoring committees.
- Educate women and the community about women's rights, gender issues, entitlements, and how to access government social security schemes.
- 4 Area: 25 villages of 5 panchayats of Ghatsila and Dhalbhumgarh blocks.
- Beneficiary Covered: Total 5603 (children-2227, youth-817 and adult-2559)

Interventions/ Activities and Achievements in Brief:

1. Capacity building of children, youth, teachers, child club facilitators, SHG women, parents and community:

RDA organised *"Educational Camp"* for selected children of all 8 TdH Suisse partners at Dhyanasharm, Kolkata in the month of February from TdH support. 4 children (2 girls & 2 boys), teachers and staffs from RDA participated in this camp. Children learnt many sciencebased experiments and solar system which helped them to study through project-based learning. Trained children of RDA, oriented total 657 children (girls-394 & boys 263) of our 5 SECs and 4 public schools. It was really very good learning for the children.

Teachers' knowledge and teaching skills on *child rights, ecological rights of children, KCS, contextual learning and interactive pedagogy* have been increased through central level teachers training organised by RDA and ASES (TdH partner) jointly at Jamshedpur and monthly training, review and planning meeting were organised by RDA at Ghatsila. Monthly training, review and planning meeting of 9 child club facilitators were also organised regularly and for these training, facilitators knowledge and skill increased to promote child rights at their area.

RDA organised online training on "*Media Literacy for protecting children and young people from cyber-crime*" for all TdH partners. This training was facilitated by expert Smt. Bidisha

Barman. This training was very effective for today's digital world and crime through media. Teachers, staffs and youth representatives were participated in this training and after the training they sensitised around 200 children and youth.

Our team organised numbers of sensitisation and capacity building training for children, youth, parents, SHG members, teachers, facilitators and VLCPC members on child rights, violence against children, child protection mechanism and support system. The organisation was also strengthened information system for on-time receiving of any case of violence against



children. At least 60% of 1800 children and young people perceive an improvement of their protection in families, child club, SEC and communities and benefiting from protective environment.

2. Right to Education: Quality education support to vulnerable tribal children

RDA is running 5 Education Support Centres at remote villages from December 2019 and providing quality education support to around 500 mostly tribal children of 6th to 10th standard every year. Most of the children are first generational learners. They don't get educational support at their home. Parents are not aware on children education which can bring changes in their life and can also change the socio-economic condition of their family. So, RDA team regularly sensitise parents, SHG women, community and local stakeholders on children education as their rights and to stop child marriage, school drop outs and child labourer. In this reporting year, there has been a notable increase in community awareness regarding the importance of girls' education and a decrease in child marriage, for continuous sensitization initiatives by the RDA team. Here are the key highlights:

- 81 students (including 52 girls) appeared in the Jharkhand Secondary Board Examination and all passed, with 58 (72%) achieving first division marks. They are now continuing their higher secondary education, with 14 in the Science stream (7 girls) and the rest in the Arts stream.
- The teaching skills of the teachers improved through various training sessions organized by TdH and RDA. Teachers developed different teaching-learning materials (TLM) to help all students, especially those who struggle. They used diverse teaching methods, such as lectures, interactive activities, and audio-visual aids, to make lessons engaging.
- Additionally
 - 2 students from Lohamalia village selected for the Tata Steel Apprenticeship program, which offers free engineering training and job opportunities.
 - 18, 7th-grade students (including 8 from the education support centers) achieved award the Tata Steel Jyoti Scholarship, receiving ₹750 per month as support of their studies.

These initiatives reflect the positive impact of RDA's efforts in fostering education and empowerment within the community.

Case Study: Rina Patar

Rina Patar is a 16-year-old girl living in Kendoposhi, a remote village in Jharkhand, India. She comes from a very poor family and lives with her mother, father, and brother. Her father is a clothes hawker and the only breadwinner, struggling to support the family. Rina's mother is part of a Self-Help Group that promotes women's rights and girls' education, encouraging Rina to continue her studies and pursue a better future.



In Jharkhand, many poor families face the issue of girl child marriage,

but Rina is determined to change this by completing her education and becoming a teacher. During the COVID-19 pandemic, when schools were closed, Rina worried about her education because her father couldn't afford private tutoring.

In 2022, Rina came to know from her friend that RDA was opening an education support center in Juktidih village for children in need. She joined right away and found joy in continuing her studies, filling in the gaps from the pandemic. Rina attended classes regularly and worked hard.

This year, she took the Jharkhand Secondary Board Examination and passed with a score of 90.6%, ranking first among 82 students from RDA's centers. She is grateful to her teachers and the support she received from RDA and TdH. Now, Rina is pursuing her Higher Secondary education in the Science stream at Karaduba TMH High School.

Rina says, "As a girl from a poor family, I never thought I could achieve my dream of being a teacher. Now, I am confident to achieve my goal."

Digital Literacy programme: Through our tablet-based digital literacy program for children aged 9-13 years, a total of 365 children (60% girls) completed their certificate course and learned basic digital skills. Since mid-2019, RDA has been running a computer training center in the village of Choroigora, located 25 km from the Ghatsila block headquarters. So far, 72 young people (58% girls) have completed a 6-month computer course. This training will help them with their further education and improve their chances of finding better jobs and improving their livelihoods.



Case Study: Diya Mandal

Diya Mandal is a seventh-grade student at Kalapathar Middle School. She expresses her enthusiasm for the RDA-STF's Tablet for Kids program, saying, "When I first heard about it, I was eager to participate. This program has really helped me, especially with my homework. Whenever I encounter a problem I can't solve, I search for solutions online and figure it out." Diya is grateful for the opportunity to learn and encourages others to take part in the program as well. "I'm very happy to be part of this course, and I'd like to thank RDA and STF for this amazing opportunity!"



Total 1027 children (58% Girls) of our SEC, child club, digital literacy centres and child cabinet are continuing their education.

<u>Right to Participation</u>:

Children's participation has increased in their families and on various platforms such as child clubs, education centers, child cabinets in public schools, village-level child protection committees (VLCPC), and other community groups. They now have more opportunities to share their opinions and take part in decision-making about child-related issues.



A total of 1,200 children and young people (700 girls and 500 boys, with 60% being girls) are involved in six different participation groups: 9 child clubs, 5 education centers (SEC), 10 child cabinets in public schools, 12 youth groups, and 1 monitoring and evaluation (M&E) committee made up of children and youth. As a result, children and youth are now more involved in planning, carrying out, and reviewing their programs and activities.

This year, children and youth organized two major community awareness events: the "Save My Planet, Save My Rights" campaign in June and the "Global Action Month" in November. In addition to these, they also celebrated "World Water Day" (March 22), "Anti-Child Labour Day" (June 12), "National Children's Day" (November 14), and "International Child Rights Day" (November 20). These events included street plays in local markets, making posters, organizing rallies in 25 villages, campaigns in 35 villages, and cleaning activities in villages and markets to raise awareness about child rights and environmental protection. Around 10,000 people in the community participated in these activities, including 2,500 children, 2,000 young people, and 5,500 adults.

Children and young people also submitted 4 appeals to local Panchayat representatives and the Jharkhand State Commission for Protection of Child Rights (SCPCR). These appeals focused on strengthening the VLCPC, improving child protection systems, continuing the Child Line service through community organizations, and providing safe drinking water and toilets in education centers and child clubs.

Right to Protection:

RDA organized several training sessions to raise awareness and build skills for children, youth, women in self-help groups (SHGs), parents, local government members (PRI), and the community. These trainings focused on protecting children from all forms of violence and explained their rights, as well as child protection systems provided by the government and RDA. As a result of these efforts, at least 60% of the 1,800 children and young people reported feeling safer at home, in child clubs, at school, and in their communities. They now benefit from a safer environment.

Children, youth, and SHG women worked together to submit 20 requests to local government members, including PRI members, the Block Development Officer, and the Jharkhand State Child Protection Commission (SCPCR). Out of these, 8 issues were successfully resolved.

The child protection focal point received reports of 5 child marriage cases from the villages where we work. All 5 child marriages were stopped, and the children involved are continuing their education. Youth volunteers also regularly checked on the children to ensure their safety.

During this period, children and youth identified 6 children who had dropped out of school and helped them re-enrolled. All 6 children are now back in school and continuing their education.

Case Study: Struggle of a Child for Achieving Her Aim

Manju Hansda, a 16 years girl lives in Jharbera, a village in Jharkhand, India, with her father, brother, and three sisters. After the death of her mother in 2020, Manju's father remarried and mostly lived with his new wife, leaving Manju responsible for the family. Her two older sisters were married and no longer at home, so Manju had to take care of household chores and farm work.

Despite these challenges, Manju was committed to her education. This year, she completed her Matric (10th grade) with a score of 69.6%, thanks to support from an educational center run by RDA. Now, she is studying in the 11th standard.

However, Manju faces mental stress as she balances her family responsibilities with her studies. Her father occasionally pressures her to stop her education and get married early. Understanding her rights and the negative effects of child marriage, Manju stands firm against his demands. She is determined to graduate, but financial struggles and time constraints make her journey difficult.

RDA continues to support Manju with both education and emotional encouragement, helping her stay focused on her goals. She is grateful for their assistance, which empowers her to strive for a brighter future despite the obstacles she faces.

Empowerment of women and their initiatives:

RDA organised numbers of sensitisation and training of SHG members and young women on women's rights and rights and entitlements of people in social security schemes, MGNREGA (Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act) and accessing procedure of rights under different schemes/ programmes.

International Women's Day Celebration – March 8, 2024

Objective: The celebration organized by SHGs promoted by RDA aimed to promote women's unity. raise awareness about women's rights and their roles as farmers, enhance access to rights, encourage participation in community development, and advocate for environmental sustainability through afforestation and organic farming.

Activities: Approximately 600 women from 80 selfhelp groups and 100 young girls from 12 youth groups participated across 25 tribal villages in five panchayats



in East Singhbhum district, Jharkhand. Activities included community rallies, slogan and poster campaigns, and leaflet distribution focused on women's rights and sustainable farming. Rallies organized in five locations reached around 3,500 people of 25 villages. The event was covered by six local print media and one audio-visual.

Appeal submission by women to authorities:

SHG women participated in their village planning meeting, panchayat meeting and submitted 12 appeals to the panchayat representatives and block development office on repairing of solar based drinking water system in school, new drinking water facility, rural road etc. Out of their 12 appeals, 4 have been resolved by the authorities.



Children and Youth-led initiatives on Environment Protection

Initiatives: Tree plantation, Seedball, promotion of organic kitchen garden, campaign on stop use of single use plastics, clean the village and community sensitization through Street Play, rally and poster campaign.

Environment protection actions:

Youth and children were planted total 1000 local species plants at road side, SEC and child clubs and homestead land of youth and children. Survival rate of plants was 75%. They were also made 10,000 seedball and threw it fallow land of 15 villages. Total 145 Youth and children

took initiative of village cleaning in 6 villages and local big market at Gandhania. They collected plastics and bio degradable waste, segregated both, damped waste separately in two pits and sensitised the community through leaflets and one to one discussion for improving their ecofriendly behaviour.

610 Children and youth (460 children's and 150 youth) from 9 child clubs, 12 youth groups and 5 Support Education Centres



(SEC) celebrated world environment day and ecological rights of children in 25 remote tribal villages of 5 panchayats of Asna, Banki, Karaduba, and Bhadua in Ghatsila block, and



Rawtara panchayat in Dhalbhumgarh block, East Singhbhum district, Jharkhand. They organized a community cleanliness programme in two villages and other activities like a cycle rally, slogan and poster campaigns, distributing leaflets, street plays, cleaning the local market (haat), and raising awareness through an auto campaign. The focus was on environmental protection, promoting child rights, and natural farming practices. Key messages delivered through these initiatives and actions were "Save

Trees," "Save Water," "Save Earth and Save Rights," and "Say No to Plastic."

Name of the Project: Lakhpati Kisan 2.0 (Phase-II)

Supported by: Collective for Integrated Livelihood Initiatives & TATA TRUSTS

The project "Building Dhalbhumgarh, East Singhbhum district in Jharkhand" aims to improve the lives of 6,000 households and promote regional growth. It began in April 2015 as part of a mission called Lakhpati Kishan - Smart Gaon - Mission 2020. The teams from CInI and RDA have been working together to develop Dhalbhumgarh by supporting successful farmers (Lakhpati Kisan) and creating smart villages.

The project focuses on high-value agriculture, especially growing vegetables for the market. After seeing good results in earlier years, the RDA team identified ways to help families become successful farmers. Most tribal families in the area have small farms, averaging 2.12 acres. Their land includes homestead, upland, and lowland areas. Over 80% of tribal people earn their living through farming and daily labor. The majority are small or marginal farmers.

In the region, there is a weekly market in Narsingarh for selling agricultural products. Nearby, Moubhandar and Kerukocha are also markets in adjacent blocks. Jamshedpur, located 50 km away, is the main agricultural market in the district where medium farmers sell their goods. There are also opportunities for larger farmers to access nearby markets like Panskura and Balasore in the future.

After seven successful years, the project has now entered Phase 2, focusing on four main areas: (a) Agriculture, (b) Water, (c) Goat Rearing, and (d) Community Institutions. The Dhalbhumgarh team is working on these areas to create positive changes in the community and continue progressing towards the project's goals.

The Project: Jal Jeevan Mission (JJM)

Integrated drinking water project in partnership with Jal Jeevan Mission at Dhalbhumgarh block of East Singhbhum district, Jharkhand.

Main Goal: The aim is to ensure that every rural household has a reliable supply of safe drinking water at a reasonable cost. This will help improve the living conditions of rural people.

Specific objectives of the project:

- 1. Provide a Functional Household Tap Connection (FHTC) to every rural home.
- 2. Focus on areas where water quality is poor.
- 3. Make sure schools, community centers, health centers, and other important buildings have working tap connections.
- 4. Create a system to monitor the condition of these tap connections.
- 5. Encourage local communities to take responsibility for water supply by contributing money, materials, or volunteer work.
- 6. Support the maintenance and sustainability of water sources and infrastructure.
- 7. Train people in skills like plumbing and water quality management for long-term care.
- 8. Raise awareness about the importance of safe drinking water.
- 9. Work closely with local councils to promote sanitation and safe water, aiming to set examples of model communities.

Project Overview:

The Rural Development Agency (RDA), in partnership with the CInI-Tata Trusts, is implementing this program called Jal Jivan Mission (JJM). The government has identified 1,592 blocks that need urgent drinking water facility support. Dhalbhumgarh Block is included in this initiative, covering 35 villages across all 10 local councils.

Progress: We have completed community orientation sessions in all 35 villages. These sessions help us understand the villagers' needs and identify potential water sources and pipeline routes. Based on this information, we will prioritize and begin work in these villages this year.



The Project: MENSTRUAL HIGENE MANAGEMENT

Nodal Agency: Collectives for Integrated Livelihood Initiatives (CInI)Menstrual Hygiene

Challenges: Menstruation is a natural process, but many girls and women in India struggle to manage it hygienically due to a lack of awareness and cultural taboos. A 2016 study found that 52% of menstruating women did not know about safe menstrual hygiene management

before their first period. Additionally, over 45% did not view menstruation as a normal biological event. In Jharkhand, a survey by CInI revealed even higher rates of unawareness: 75% of rural-tribal women and adolescent girls were unaware of menstruation before their first period, and 82% did not see it as a natural process. This lack of knowledge often leads to





unhygienic

practices, increasing the risk

of infections and serious health issues like cervical cancer.

The silence surrounding menstruation reinforces gender inequalities and restricts the movement of women and girls. This project aims to improve the health and wellbeing of rural-tribal women and girls in East Singhbhum district by engaging them in discussions and activities

about Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM).
